Use this toolkit, along with the book *Lyla the Love Bug*, to help your young ones understand the meaning of love. Find the book, as well as Spookley and Lyla's Valentine's Day show and song, on Spookley's YouTube Channel.

| QUESTIONS | KEY THEMES AND OBJECTIVES | | | |
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| Lyla takes good care of her rose and doesn't mind that it has a black spot. Why? | She identifies with the rose because she feels she isn't perfect either. Guide children to appreciate what makes something or someone unique, even if it isn't seen as a good thing at first. | | | |
| Lyla notices that all the ladybugs pay attention to a ladybug with 10 spots. Why do you think they follow her? | The other ladybugs think that more spots mean the bug is better, regardless of what they are like on the inside. <i>Encourage children to consider characteristics that are more than skin deep.</i> | | | |
| Lyla finally realizes that she loves her rose the best. Why didn't she realize it before? | It didn't seem special to her because it was always there. Help children notice the wonderful things that are right under their noses! | | | |
| At the end of the book Lyla has changed on the outside: she has new heart-shaped spots. Has she changed inside too? | Yes! Lyla has gained new knowledge and understands what love is. <i>Introduce the concepts of inside vs outside change.</i> | | | |

ideas for teamwork

- 1. Lyla talks to other creatures in the greenhouse to find out what they love: bees love honey, butterflies love sunshine, and ants love to work. Have you ever tried something new and discovered that you like it or love it... or not enjoy it at all? Find out if other people in your class or family have tried it and what did they think. Ask them why.
- 2. At the beginning of the book, Lyla loves her rose even though it has a spot. Gather as a group and share something you love even though it has a flaw—or maybe because it has a flaw! (Teachers, this could be a fun show-and-tell.)
- 3. At the end of the book, Lyla realizes that love comes in different forms, such as caring, sharing, and friendship. In a group, each person can think of a way to show love without actually saying it, then write it down. You do not need to put your name on it. The teacher collects the papers and reads them out loud. Did anyone think of the same thing?

Storytelling



Different but the Same




